Entrance requirements:

Kindergarten children must be 5 years of age by August 15, 2023

Grade 1 children must be 6 years of age by August 15, 2023

When to Keep Sick Children at Home

🗐 Instructions


Strong passwords are important. Decide which passwords are strongest. Get one or more family members together to help. Read the setup before doing the activity together!

چ^ای Setup

Read aloud: First, it's important to only share passwords with trusted adults. We don't share with friends or log into someone else's account. Then, think about the passwords we use online. We don't want them to be too easy for someone else to figure out. It's best to think of a phrase that's easy to remember. Then we can use the first letter of each word to create our password. Including numbers helps, too. Are our passwords strong enough?

🛞 Activity

Read aloud: Let's look at these passwords and draw a line to where they fall on the strong scale.



Let's talk about which ones are the strongest and why. Which two are definitely too simple? Which one has letters and numbers but also easy-to-find personal information? Which one could use some numbers? And which one has the first letters of a phrase with numbers? (That's the strongest!)

Instructions

It's important to know what information is OK to share online. What should we keep private and what is OK to share? Get one or more family members together to help. Read the setup before doing the activity together!

Setup (دلایی)

Read aloud: It's in our nature to share and connect with others. But sharing online comes with some risks. It is OK to share personal information. **Personal information** includes things like what you like to do, your favorite movie, ideas that you have, or even pictures of your pet. It is risky to share private information with someone you don't know or with everyone online. **Private information** includes things that identify you, such as your full name, home address, phone number, school, or date of birth.

🕜 Activity

Read aloud: Let's read the chat between Alex and a person they met online, and then talk about who is sharing private information and who is sharing personal information.

Discussion questions: What personal information is shared? What information should be kept private? Does it seem like Alex knows this person? Does that change how we respond to people online? Why is it OK to share personal information but not private information online? What can you say or do when someone asks for private information online?

🗐 Instructions

The internet is full of catchy headlines and outrageous images, all to make us curious and get our attention. But sometimes what you see is not what you get. Which would you click? Get one or more family members together to help. Read the setup before doing the activity together!

క్రహ్హ Setup

Read aloud: Clickbait is an image or headline that tries to get you to click on it, usually when they are trying to sell you something or collect your data. How can we avoid clickbait? You can usually spot clickbait because it is **impossible**, **unbelievable**, **or shocking**! Clickbait might refer to celebrities or another popular topic; it might be a list, contest, or quiz; and it might include attention-grabbing photographs.

🕜 Activity

Read aloud: Let's read the headlines below, then talk about which ones might be clickbait and why. For each headline, talk about: How is it trying to grab our attention? Does it seem impossible? Is it trying to shock us?
